A Message from the City Council

As we welcome a new year, many Winston residents are taking time to look over their property tax statements. We know these statements can raise questions, so we want to offer a clear explanation of how your tax dollars are allocated.

Only three portions of your property tax bill are not tied to voter-approved measures:

- City Taxes
- County Taxes
- School District Taxes

Every other line item on the statement is the result of levies or bonds approved by the voters.

Here is the general breakdown of how the total property tax is distributed:

- 40% supports the school district
- 38% goes to general government services (excluding the City of Winston)
- 22% funds the City of Winston

When you review your complete property tax bill, you'll find that the largest share comes from voter-approved levies and bonds, not from the city portion alone. The City of Winston continues to maintain a tax rate that is noticeably lower than many other components of the overall tax structure.

Thank you for your continued support and engagement in our community. We look forward to serving you throughout the coming year.

A Message from the Chief of Police

Dear Winston Community,

I am pleased to share an important update regarding our ongoing efforts to improve traffic and safety in and around our schools. Earlier this year, the Winston Police Department applied for an Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) grant to fund the installation of radar speed signs in designated school zones. I am proud to announce that our department was awarded \$24,000 through this grant program funding that has allowed us to purchase six new radar speed signs for our community.

Two of these signs have been installed on Thompson Avenue within the school zone, and two additional signs have been placed on Cary Street, also within the school zone. These locations were selected based on traffic patterns, safety concerns expressed by residents, and the goal of creating safer routes for students walking or biking to school.

In the coming weeks, the remaining two signs will be installed in the Lookingglass community near Lookingglass School. This expansion into the surrounding area reflects our commitment to supporting the safety of students not only within Winston, but in neighboring communities as well.

These radar speed signs serve as both a reminder and a tool helping drivers remain aware of their speed while promoting safer travel through areas where our children are present. While enforcement remains an important element of traffic safety, education and awareness are equally critical. These signs help us achieve that balance.

On behalf of the Winston Police Department, I want to thank the City of Winston Public Works Department for its support with the installation, ODOT for its financial support, Douglas County Public Works for its partnership, and our community members for their continued dedication to safety. Together, we are taking meaningful steps to protect our kids and create a safer environment for everyone.
